

Parish Council News

The Sale of the George & Dragon Community Centre

This sale has been a protracted one, but on 30th June 2000, Cedar Tree Printers became the new owners of the George & Dragon building. It was at the Annual Parish Meeting, held in April 1999, that the sale of this property appeared as an item on the agenda, purposely included as all parishioners were eligible to attend that meeting and exercise their voting rights. After discussion it was formally agreed that the sale should go ahead. Your Parish Council recommended this course of action as the George & Dragon had not altogether fulfilled the high hopes that the then council had for it when it purchased the building in 1985. It certainly never became a real Community Centre, it was underused and the precept payers of Temple Ewell have been paying out for the repayment of the loan taken out for the purchase.

However, the present council defended the action of the 1985 council in making the initial purchase and now that the sale has been completed certain assets of the original sale have been retained and safeguarded for the village as a whole. Cedar Tree Printers have only bought the building - the upper and lower car parks and Dragon Wood are still in the possession of the Parish Council for the use and enjoyment of all. Covenants have been included in the sale which ensure that the appearance of the exterior of the building will not be altered and that no future applications for development can be approved without the full permission of Temple Ewell Parish Council. Throughout lengthy negotiations your Parish Council has aimed to do it's utmost to safeguard the interests of the residents of Temple Ewell.

The council wishes the new owners continuing good fortune and prosperity in their business. Steve and Mike have become good friends of Temple Ewell.

For the good news - as a result of the sale the Parish Council's deposit account has been increased by money in the region of £60,000. This is obviously money which truly belongs to the precept-payers of Temple Ewell over several years (although the Parish Council, in it's role of guardianship, must have the ultimate decision on how it is spent).

Therefore as a first step, we are inviting ideas from you, the parishioners, to give suggestions as to how this money can be spent for the good of our village and as many residents as possible. We must not come to any hasty decisions and this consultation process could be a lengthy one, but please, please start the ball rolling by filling in the accompanying sheet with your suggestions. The sheet has deliberately been left blank so that the views put forward are your own and not any pre-suggested by the council. Return the sheet to the box provided in the village shop by 31st October. We are hoping for a big response and we will keep you well informed of future moves.

This seems a really good starting point for our new village Newsletter - please involve yourselves and your friends and neighbours in the consultation process in the hope that Temple Ewell will gain a long term asset(s).

The War Memorial

July 2000 saw the restoration of our village war memorial in the churchyard. The monument was in sore need of cleaning and re-lettering and the Parish Council hopes that all are pleased with the result.

The service is in the hall and the speaker is Mrs Sheila Swan. If you would like to join us and need transport please contact Jean on 823692





Police news from P.C. Ian Foster, Neighbourhood Watch Liaison Officer

Over the coming months, in conjunction with Neighbourhood Watch on the Internet, we aim to bring you information and advice that will help you feel safer in your car, at home, in the office or when you go on holiday. We have teamed up with leading industry experts to provide you with up to the minute advice on crime prevention and personal safety issues. Each month we will address a topic that is in the news, or that has been highlighted by one of our readers like yourself. So if you have a concern about any area of crime why not contact us and we will consider it for a future issue.

If you are unfortunate enough to come home and find your house has been broken into, burgled.com can help you find out exactly what help is available, including information about the Burgled Helpline. Launched as a national service in September, the Burgled Helpline provides an emergency telephone line for those who have been burgled. After reporting the burglary to the police, one further call will allow victims to access emergency glazing and locksmiths as well as those who can advise on better home security, quote on replacements for items stolen, help the victim with their insurance claim and produce a record of property owned as a protection against future loss. The service will be supported by a nation-wide team of retired police officers with crime prevention experience, available to compliment the crime prevention support to burglary victims offered by serving police officers.



Old public convenience, London Road - we were all taken by surprise when the bus shelter was demolished, but Roger Walton of the District Council assures me the exterior of the remaining building will be tidied up at the council's expense and that a new bus shelter is to be provided closer to the layby at the bottom of the bank.

Recycling - the possibility of further recycling banks being provided by the District Council at the rear George and Dragon car park has been looked into. However, the access for servicing vehicles has been found to be unsuitable. Unless an alternative site can be found we must make do with just the paper bank. This is a shame because the village could have benefited from funds raised by the recycling.

Kearsney Abbey - the controversy about the swans continues. A petition doing the rounds asks the question 'do you wish swans to remain at Kearsney Abbey where they have lived for hundreds of years?' I think we would all answer yes to that one. However, this is a misleading question. No-one is proposing to move all the swans, only to bring the numbers down and for the artificial feeding to stop. The swans are far outnumbered by seagulls, who are opportunist birds that have been encouraged inland by the quantity of bread that's been made available. We can only hope that the action being taken by the District Council will help to discourage the seagulls, that end up nesting on our chimneys and 'bombing' our vehicles.

How many remember the Abbey Lake when it was full of greenery, with sticklebacks, tadpoles and even trout in abundance? Wouldn't it be great if it could be like that again?







ANIMAL JOTTINGS



Care of Rabbits

Rather than lecturing everyone on our favourite creepy-crawlies, namely fleas and worms, I thought I would write this article about that popular, but often neglected, pet - the rabbit. However, the fleas and worms will return - literally!

Rabbits are now Britain's third most popular pet, and this is due more to the way that they fit in to people's busy lifestyles in this day and age than the prolific speed at which they breed. There are approximately 1.6 million pet rabbits in the United Kingdom today, and this number is increasing all the time. Vets are seeing more and more bunnies almost daily, and there is nothing nicer than finding we are preaching to the converted when informing owners as to the proper care of their new pets. However, depressingly, we still see a high number of irreversible problems which could so easily have been prevented if the poor creature presented to us with its runny eyes, snuffly nose, drooling mouth, diarrhoea had been looked after properly from the start. Most problems arise simply due to ignorance, so I hope some of my words will find their mark!

The most common abnormalities seen by our practice and other practices around the country relate to bed teeth. The vast majority of dental problems are caused by the long term feeding of an inadequate diet. Unfortunately, because rabbits are selective feeders, they often do not eat all of the diet given to them. Many proprietary brands of rabbit food are not balanced, and long-term feeding of many of these leads to calcium deficiency. This in turn leads to weak skull bones which causes the teeth to move out of position, leading to uneven wear of the teeth which are continually growing. This can lead to abscesses developing underneath the tooth roots, spikes developing on the ends of the teeth that tend to damage the tongue and cause severe pain on feeding, and impaction of the teeth themselves preventing them from growing. Impaction of the tooth roots leads to other problems for example blockage of the tear ducts and therefore chronic conjunctivitis.

Wild rabbits never develop dental problems. This is because their diet is made up mainly of grass and other vegetable matter. It is fair to say that if a pet rabbit is fed approximately 80% of its ration as grass or good-quality, sweet smelling hay, and 20% of its diet a good quality complete mix (see your vet for a recommended food), then it is very unlikely to develop dental problems and the associated conditions. Dental conditions, because they cause pain, often lead on to other problems such as a lack of grooming, which may in turn lead to soiling around the anus which predisposes to fly strike and maggot infestations. It sounds ghastly, but, sadly, it does happen. In addition, a high fibre diet is essential for good digestion, again reducing the amount

of soiling.

In addition rabbits are social creatures that live in large groups. It's a good idea, therefore, to keep rabbits with at least one other rabbit, or a guinea pig if introduced at an early age. Obviously if two males (bucks) are kept together they may fight and should be castrated (neutered). However there are other health problems associated with the female rabbit, or doe, if she is unneutered. We now know that as many as half the does aged over five years will develop cancer of the uterus. Unless caught very early, which is unlikely, this disease is invariably fatal as the cancer spreads to other areas or the body, particularly the lungs. For this reason it is strongly recommended that all female rabbits, unless intended for breeding, should be spayed (neutered) at an early age. Recent developments in the anaesthesia of pet rabbits means that the complication rate, although still higher than that associated with the anaesthesia of other species such as cats and dogs, is far lower than it used to be, and we do not anaesthetise rabbits with the same fear and trepidation that we used to. As for housing, keeping a rabbit in a hutch with little or no access to a good run is

actually very cruel, and leads to boredom, soiling and obesity. Free access to a secure run is ideal - particularly if the run is grassed. Being outside also promotes Vitamin D production in the skin, just as for us, essential for healthy bones and teeth. Rabbits are great burrowers, so a close watch needs to be kept for holes! Beware of foxes though; the run does need to be secure. Building a large outdoor run could even be a fun project for Dad for a sunny weekend! If not, something like a chicken run would be suitable. The RSPCA has some excellent leaflets on housing rabbits - your vet should be able to either supply one or give you the telephone number of the RSPCA headquarters. Rabbits can even be successfully kept as house pets, they can be house trained, but still need access to fresh, good-quality hay. Many houseplants can be toxic to rabbits, and care must be taken as they delight in chewing wires, which obviously can be very dangerous.

If you require further information on the housing and husbandry of rabbits, please do not hesitate to contact your veterinary practice for advice. Rabbits really do make great pets: they are lively, full of character and very sociable. Feeding them doesn't cost much, you don't have to take them out for walks, and they need very little grooming (angoras excepted). Let's give them the life they deserve,

LYDDEN & TEMPLE EWELL NATURE RESERVE

Overlooking Temple Ewell from the north and the neighbouring village of Lydden, is the Lydden and Temple Ewell Nature Reserve. This area of ancient chalk grassland, two hundred acres in all, is owned and managed by The Kent Wildlife Trust; and was declared a National Nature Reserve in August 1998.

Aside from the periodic clearance of invading scrub, the regular grazing of livestock plays a vital role in the management of the downland. These practices have gone on for centuries and as a result the area is home to an immense variety of wild flowers. Where the turf is short, carpets of Wild Thyme are found along with Bird's Foot Trefoil, Eyebright, Rock Rose, Centuary, Chalk Milkwort and Small Scabious. Marjoram and Greater Knapweed prefer areas where the grass is long.


Several species of Orchid appear throughout the Summer, among them are; Bee, Fragrant, Burnt Tip and the specially protected Early Spider Orchid. During the late Summer, Autumn Gentian, Devil's Bit Scabious and Autumn Ladies Tresses come into flower.

About thirty species of Butterflies have been recorded on the reserve. Several Blues including; Chalkhill, Small, Common and Adonis breed here. Marbled Whites and Meadow Brows inhabit the taller grasses. 1999 was a record year for the rare Silver Spotted Skipper. Before its introduction to two other sites, this was the only other site in Kent where this Butterfly could be found.

Other insects here include several species of Grasshoppers, Crickets like the Great Green and the rare Wart Biter. The Wart Biter Cricket was said to have become extinct from this site in the 1970's, it was reintroduced in recent years and is now breeding successfully. Although its numbers are still being carefully monitored.

The resident bird species include Linnets, which nest among the gorse thickets, Yellow Hammers, Sky Larks and Meadow Pipets, Kestrels are often seen hovering over the steep slopes of the downland. Green Woodpeckers are sometimes seen breaking into the anthills after the insects on which they feed. Summer visitors such as Black Caps, White Throats, Lesser White Throats and Willow Warblers may be seen in the wooded areas and surrounding hedgerows.
